

From the Pastor...

The cruel killing of George Floyd has sparked outrage in our country. Of course, the anger has been there for a long time – usually dwelling below the surface, but often erupting into view. Or at least that is what it seems like to those of us who aren't burdened by racism on a daily basis.

Our African-American brothers and sisters have a different experience. They live with the realities of racism every day. Their grief over George Floyd is just one more wound in a long line of offenses. They understand, as we must come to know, that racism is perpetual and systematic and will not be defeated guickly or easily.

Racism, in all of its ugly forms, will only end when those of us who have power and privilege care enough to change and demand change in others. It is easy to focus on the riots and miss the cry of desperation they represent. It is easy to condemn overt acts of racism and not examine our role in systemic racism.

Larry Hovis, Coordinate for the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship of North Carolina, recently asked some of his African-American colleagues for guidance on what white Christians might do to help. Here is what they suggested:

- **Pray** Yes, we must do more than pray, but we dare not do less. Let us "pray without ceasing" (1 Thess. 5:17) for our nation, our African-American (and Latino) brothers and sisters, and our leaders.
- **Repent** White Christians must repent of the part we have played in creating and perpetuating an unjust system.
- **Listen** We must genuinely and deeply listen to the voices of people color, and of the experiences of discrimination, brutality and injustice they and their ancestors have experienced for four centuries.
- **Speak** Those of us who have positions of privilege must speak up. Now is not the time to keep quiet.
- **Educate** White Americans, including white Christians, are woefully ignorant when it comes to race. CBFNC offers much information on racial equity and justice on its website at https://cbfnc.org/embrace/racial-reconcilia tion-and-justice/.
- Advocate Starting with our own personal relationships and moving to our churches, communities, nation and
 world, we must advocate for just policies, laws and structures for all people policies, laws and structures that
 address past injustices and create a more just world for everyone, especially those for whom justice has been both
 delayed and denied.

The easy thing to do is to just let racism be someone else's problem. Christ, however, never took the easy way. He always cared for the downtrodden and constantly confronted injustice. Ultimately Jesus took up the cross for us and called us to take up the cross for others. Christ was compelled by love. Are we?

A Different Kind of Vacation Bible School





Draw Near to God

Jim Cymbala is pastor of the 10,000 member Brooklyn Tabernacle Church in Brooklyn, NY. About 10 years into his pastorate there (which started with fewer than 10 people) God convicted him to make prayer the barometer that guides the church and the engine that drives the church. In an era when weekly church prayer meetings have turned to Bible studies and seminars, Brooklyn Tabernacle has for decades been drawing more than 1,000 people every Tuesday night for intercession. (I know this to be a fact because I've had the privilege of attending this "standing room only" prayer meeting.) Specific prayer requests are printed on cards and passed out to attendees, who alternate between praying and praising God through music for hours. Cymbala says, "Right now there are some very dangerous movements in the church- although attended with numerical success- which are very detrimental to the cause of Christ. It's Christianity-lite. We have learned how to do church without God, without the Holy Spirit. We need to re-evaluate narrowly scripted programs that seemingly leave no time or space for the Holy Spirit to move and work among the people gathered."

I just returned from Juarez, Mexico, where on behalf of our non-profit, The Off Ramp, I took a tour of shelters for asylum seekers in and around Juarez, across the Rio Grande from El Paso. Opportunities abound, but there is work to do!

There was laughter. There were tears. There were questions. There was deep appreciation. There was wonder. From children who had not been warm in weeks yet smiled and played, to an 80-year-old woman huddled under blankets yet rising to greet us, our hearts were touched by the situation these forcibly displaced people endured. Still, we were encouraged!

As Enrique Valenzuela put it, "This is not a crisis! We just need to all come together and figure out how we can handle the situation." To think crisis is to think negatively. These people thought in the positive, bringing to the table all the assets of each organization and individual. Result? Dignity and care for the forcibly displaced.

Mission Bite: 184: The God Who Sees

Serving and meeting the needs of refugees can be a bit more problematic these days as churches and businesses are closed and we are asked to be socially distant. Refugees are very hospitable and want you to sit and have a cup of tea with them, yet now I wear a mask and gloves and drop things at the door and run.

Last week I called Justin, a Congolese refugee friend who has a newborn and asked how they were doing. He replied well, but that they were needing formula to supplement breastfeeding. He had gone to several stores and was unable to find what they needed. I told him I would pray that God would provide.

Formula is not something that I typically have donated. Monday, I went to the room at church where I keep donations looking for household items for a newly arrived Afghan family, and sitting on the counter was a bag with 6 cans on formula. Three cans were the formula Justin was looking for. I texted Justin that God had answered our prayer.

Tuesday, I returned to the church to sort bags of children's clothing, which literally covered the entire floor. As I was sorting, I received a text from World Relief asking if I would be able to help a client who was expecting in a month. Of course, as God had already provided everything needed.

That evening as I was packing the car, I received another text stating the newly arrived Afghan mother needed formula with a photo of the formula. It was by no coincidence that it was the remaining three donated cans of formula

We serve a God who sees and knows needs long before we do, and provides exactly what we need when we need it.
