Missions is an essential aspect of the heritage and hope of First Baptist Church. As Baptists, missions is a part of our very being. From our inception, Baptists have been on mission to share the Good News of Christ throughout the entire world. The very founding of First Baptist Church of Statesville was one aspect of this mission.

Because we were founded as a part of the call to missions, we have always made missions a central aspect of our ministry. First Baptist Church helped start both Western Avenue Baptist Church and Front Street Baptist Church. We also helped several local ministries get their start; including Iredell Christian Ministries, Fifth Street Ministries, Habitat for Humanity and the CareNet Counseling Center.

Globally we have funded missionaries through both the International Mission Board (SBC) and the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship. Along with giving a portion of our offerings to support thousands of missionaries, members of our own church have heeded the Gospel call. First Baptist missionaries have served in Japan, China, Indonesia and the Middle East.

As a part of celebrating our legacy of missions, First Baptist Church will hear from our own missionaries to Japan this Sunday, February 2, 2020. Carson (who grew up at FBCS) and Laura Foushee will share about their work partnering with the Japanese Baptist Convention. We will also renew our covenant with them to be an Encourager Congregation.

We are also in the midst of celebrating and strengthening our partnerships with local mission organizations. Each Wednesday evening in January and February we are hearing from ministry groups we support with our funds and volunteers. So far we have heard from Iredell Statesville Schools Bible Association, Habitat for Humanity, CareNet Counseling, and Power Cross Ministries.

We are looking forward to hearing from Fifth Street Ministries (2/5/20), the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship of NC (2/12/20) and Hospice of Iredell (2/19/20). We are also currently collecting food to support Iredell Christian Ministries and look forward to hearing from them at sometime in the future. First Baptist Church has been and will continue to be one of the strongest supporters of missions in Iredell and beyond.

It is said the Church lives by missions and so do local congregations. As much as we celebrate our deep heritage of mission involvement, our hope is rooted in sharing the Gospel as well. Each generation must find relevant ways to show God's love within our communities and world. First Baptist Church of Statesville will continue to be a shining light of God's grace..

10 Benefits of Being a Church Volunteer by Brian Dodd

During the summer of 1986, I was working in a grocery store while attending college. This job came with the unbelievable benefit of one unpaid week of vacation per year. So when July came I had a decision to make. Should I go to the beach for sun, fun and relaxation or should I make the strategic decision to teach 2nd graders in Vacation Bible School?

I did not realize it at the time but this one single decision put me on a path I would continue on to this very day. With the exception of two paid staff positions, I have served as a volunteer at my local church for the next 29 years.

As I reflect on the last three decades of my life, the following are 10 Benefits Of Being A Volunteer At A Local Church:

- 1. Volunteering At My Church Has Given My Life Greater Purpose There are a numerous important causes in the world and quality places to volunteer your time. But for me, I made the strategic decision to serve at my church because it was there where my efforts could result in someone's life being changed for eternity. It is in a local church where a person could be made brand new and become redeemed.
- 2. Volunteering At My Church Has Given Me Broader Perspective Serving others has allowed me to focus on larger issues and others rather than always on myself.
- 3. Volunteering At My Church Has Given Me Lifelong Friendships There is a unique relational bond which comes from "being in the foxhole" with someone and serving together. I have made literally hundreds of personal connections and lifelong friends because of volunteering at my church.
- 4. Volunteering At My Church Has Given Me A Healthier Self-Image It may sound egotistical but there is a healthy sense of pride which comes from serving others and not being called to a lesser task. You just feel better about yourself when your life matters and makes a difference.
- 5. Volunteering At My Church Helps Others Living an internally focused life benefits no one. Serving others relieves suffering, benefits the under-resourced, meets the needs of the marginalized, provides hope, and improves the quality of people's lives.
- 6. Volunteering At My Church Has Made Me More Generous Generosity is time, talent and treasure. Church volunteers give sacrificially of their time and talent BEFORE giving sacrificially of their treasure. It is a sequential process. By being generous with my time and talent, financial generosity has been a natural outflow.
- 7. Volunteering At My Church Taught Me How To Make Better Decisions When I used to teach Sunday School in college, I could have gone out every Saturday night with the guys. However, I learned early in the process the best decisions come when you give up what is good (Saturday night with the guys) for what is best (studying on Saturday nights to serve others on Sunday mornings).
- 8. Volunteering At My Church Makes Me A Better Thinker Being a quality volunteer requires sacrifice, study and preparation. Volunteering at my church has made me smarter.
- 9. Volunteering At My Church Has Given Me Lasting Influence My daughter knows nothing other than her parents serving others. A privilege I never planned when I took my first volunteer role in 1986 was one day I would be passing on a legacy of service to the next generation.
- 10. Volunteering At My Church Will One Day Result In A Greater Reward Like many of you, I look forward to the day when I hear my Heavenly Father say "Well done my good and faithful servant".

At sporting events those in the stands pay to watch the game. Those on the field get paid! The same is true for church volunteers.

If you are not volunteering in your local church, it is time to get on the field and start getting paid with these incredible benefits I have listed.

Funeral or Wedding

Most of us have at least a little fear of death, even when we know we'll be with Jesus in heaven. The older I get, the more my prayers center on asking God to take away any fear I may have and replace it with anticipation. One of the things I love most about prayer is the way God answers! As Psalm 27 teaches us, when we wait on the Lord, He will answer. Recently, He led me to a devotional which I will paraphrase: Think of death, not as a funeral, but as a wedding. Jesus has gone to prepare a place for us in His Father's house, and when He comes back for us it will be a grand wedding celebration. (Adapted from "Fearless" by Max Lucado) Don't you love it? Can you hear the wedding music? What bride looks with foreboding to her wedding day?? So, let's turn our minds around. Instead of dreading death (if you are a Christian), think of it as your ultimate wedding day! (If you don't know Jesus, He's just waiting for you to invite Him into your heart.)

Whatever concerns or fears you may have, take them to God in prayer. He will put your mind at rest. His very name is Peace—"Jehovah Shalom".

As a kindergartner, Dustin couldn't focus in class because of the pain in his mouth. He had been living in El Salvador with his grandmother, who hadn't paid much attention to dental hygiene. Dustin's gums were swollen and his teeth throbbed. A local pediatric dentist, Dr. S., agreed to treat him, in spite of Dustin's mom's inability to pay.

Dr. S. has a way with kids. None are thrilled to be spending hours in his dental chair, but he is patient and kind, and works through an interpreter. "I'm sorry it hurts, but I want to help you," he tells them.

Dustin, Carlitos, Jonathan, and Jeycob—Salvadoran, Mexican, and Honduran—all helped by an immigrant dentist from another part of the world who looks like them, with brown skin and an accent. "Maybe I'll be a dentist one day, too," Jonathan told Dr. S.

Lord, we thank you for specialists like Dr. S. Who are willing to donate portions of their time and expertise to help migrant children experiencing physical pain. We give thanks that these children can receive quality treatment. And we thank you especially for immigrant professionals who model care and compassion and offer hope to these children.
